

## **Operational Update: Level 1**

<b>Key points:</b> As of this morning yard utilisation in the main yard is sitting at 121%. Please				
expect delays to truck turn times and limitations in our ability to provide any additional VBS slots.				
We have in recent weeks increased our level of vessel inspection ahead of container terminal operations as a ship berths to commence work. This has highlighted a number of deficiencies in ships gear and the onboard safety environment. We are working closely with the vessels and Lines concerned but it is resulting in longer inspection times and delays to cargo operations. We appreciate that this can be a frustration in terms of vessel operating times and goods to market. This is not an exhaustive process but a critical one in terms of our Strong foundations, Safe People program of work.

Container Terminal Operations				
Berth windows and vessel schedules – Berth windows remain suspended.				
Considerable effort is being made to identify how best to reinstate berth windows whilst also being able to support the ongoing demand of vessels if any become delayed at other Ports. As we prepare the terminal for 'full terminal roll out' of Automation, planned for July at this stage, it is likely we will only be able to achieve a phased reinstatement of the windows – a few services at a time as and when additional labour capacity comes into the operation. We expect this will start from early May and are currently evaluating options with a number of Lines to fix start up dates.

<b>Labour supply</b> – Training and recruitment is ongoing as planned. We are still exposed				
to labour sign offs at various shift times as every business has to contend with. By				
building labour capacity will minimise these operational impacts. This work is ongoing.				
Yard Capacity – As of today, the main terminal is approx. 121% utilised and Automation				
yard at 53%.

please continue to monitor separate advisories regarding delivery instructions with updates as space is at critical levels.

**Road Services** – between Wednesday and Thursday this week, we have delivered out 1,066 via road and 231 via rail. With 603 import containers delivered via road on Friday, average truck turn times remained under 37 minutes. Weekend turn around times didn't exceed 23 minutes.

Today R&D operations today are heavy but running well. There is limited flexibility around VBS bookings. We will be assisting with VBS for fully cleared import DG and reefers. For Late Receival approvals please apply through Customer Service Team.

**Berth and Yard Capacity** – PCC berths are at 100% with Container/Bulk berths at 60% about utilisation. Jellicoe and Freyberg container and breakbulk yards are currently at 60% and is expected to increase to 80%.

Captain Cook, Marsden, Bledisloe yard and the CHF are at 100% utilisation with 5 PCC vessels in this week.

**Road Services** – Container and Breakbulk R&D will continue to be steady for both receivals and deliveries. Vehicle Transporters remain extremely busy for the foreseeable future – Transporters are encouraged to communicate with Multi Cargo Ops for staging area/s. Bulk R&D expected to increase over next fortnight with increased movements through the port.

**Other** - COVID controls, including social distancing and masks (PPE) are expected. Observations will continue by POAL staff, coaching will be undertaken if expectations are not met.
