# Wiri rail link to take pressure off Auckland roads

A planned rail link at Ports of Auckland's inland port at Wiri, South Auckland will help take pressure off Auckland roads.

On 6 November the Government announced it was putting \$6m into the project, which it's hoped will be up and running by mid-2009.

#### Giraffes on the move

Two young giraffes loaded onto a ship at the Ports of Auckland in November have arrived safely in Australia after a sevenday voyage.

Port staff hooked chains underneath steel lugs on the bottom of the giraffes' crates, before using a crane to transfer the giraffes to the ship. The rail link will mean businesses can drop off and pick up their goods at Wiri, instead of driving through the central city to the seaport.

When fully operational, the rail link could save a forecast 100,000 truck trips in and out of Auckland – 2.5 million truck

"The word on the ground is that the giraffes really enjoyed all the attention," Stevedoring Manager Jonathan Hulme says. "We went the extra mile to minimise noise and keep them as calm as possible."

The giraffes, Ntombi and Forrest, who are headed for a breeding programme, were born at Auckland Zoo.

"This is great news for our neighbours and the wider Auckland community," Ports of Auckland Managing Director Jens Madsen says. "We hope to lift the proportion of port cargo carried by rail from 10% to 30%."



### **Environmentally-friendly car** ship visits Ports of Auckland

Earlier this month the *Aniara*, the world's biggest and most environmentally-friendly car carrying ship, called into Jellicoe Wharf on its maiden voyage.

One of the largest ships ever to call New Zealand, the mammoth vessel can carry up to 8,000 cars stowed over 13 decks, and holds a 'Green Passport' for environmental efficiency. The ship is operated by the Wallenius Wilhelmsen line.

## Update on Queens Wharf

Queens Wharf is one of the port's "finger wharves", right in the heart of downtown Auckland. We are currently participating in an Auckland Regional Council-led study into whether a cruise ship terminal could be developed on Queens Wharf, alongside other port operations.

Ports of Auckland will require compensation for any full or partial release of Queens Wharf, so that replacement cargo handling facilities can be funded.
