Ports of Auckland





A technical study on Upper North Island port capacity has found that Ports of Auckland can handle growth for the next 30 years – if it gets a lot more efficient.

The study was commissioned by the Upper North Island Strategic Alliance, a partnership between councils in the region, formed to foster long-term collaboration on key issues. The study looked at current and future freight demand, and scenarios to meet that demand.

Auckland's port handled 808,655 containers (TEU) last financial year and this is expected to grow to between 1.53 million and 2.07 million containers a year by 2041. This is a big increase, but according to the study we can handle

this, if we make "significant operating efficiencies." Put simply, if we work smarter we can do a lot more on the land we've already got.

The study found that even with greater efficiency, the port is likely to need more wharf space by 2041, especially if more of the waterfront is opened up to the public. However any future reclamation would be much smaller than previously imagined.

### Other findings:

 Moving Auckland's port to Whangarei isn't viable. The cost of a new container terminal plus new road and rail links would be massive, and moving the port away from Auckland would make imports and exports more expensive.

- Building a new port isn't viable either, it would have even bigger financial and environmental costs.
- The upper North Island needs its three ports to become more efficient and grow incrementally.

The report is good news for Ports of Auckland. It provides some certainty about our place in the city and shows that it is possible for us to meet the challenges ahead as long as we make the most of our potential. We are changing the way we work and we are determined to succeed.

### Industrial Relations - Update

Ports of Auckland Ltd (POAL) and the Maritime Union of New Zealand (MUNZ) are in 'facilitation' in an effort to agree a new collective agreement covering MUNZ members at the port. Facilitation is a confidential bargaining process held under the guidance of the Employment Relations Authority.

Auckland's Mayor, Len Brown, wrote to MUNZ and POAL this month setting out his expectation that the industrial trouble of the past year would be solved through facilitation. "I hold a strong expectation of both the Port company and the Union to use the recommendations from the facilitation process as a vehicle for ending the dispute", he said.

POAL welcomes the Mayor's letter. We're fully focussed on achieving a modern collective that will give us the flexibility we need to remain competitive in order to provide well-paid, secure jobs for our staff.

### **Community Reference Group**

Ports of Auckland's Community Reference Group provides a forum for dialogue and discussion with neighbours and community representatives.

The group meets once a quarter to discuss topics like port development, noise, traffic and lighting.
