Queen Mary 2 visits Auckland

The *Queen Mary 2*, the largest ship to ever visit New Zealand, made her second call at Ports of Auckland on 23 February. At 345 metres, the luxury cruise liner is the length of 3.5 rugby

pitches! Because of her size, the liner was berthed within the commercial port instead of the cruise terminal at Princes Wharf. The *Queen Mary 2*, which was en route to Sydney, was carrying nearly

4,000 passengers and crew.

The arrival of the *Queen Mary 2* caps off a bumper season for cruise ships at Ports of Auckland, with 25 vessels visiting in February.

Berth deepening

Delegates from the Port of Hakata in Japan recently visited Ports of Auckland to celebrate the 30th anniversary of our Sister-Port relationship.

A pohutukawa tree was planted next to Tamaki Drive to commemorate the anniversary. The visit was timed over Auckland Anniversary Weekend, with the delegates taking the opportunity to see the sights of the city. A tour of the Royal New Zealand Navy frigate the HMNZS Te Mana was a special highlight.

As part of the redevelopment of the Wynyard Quarter tank farm, Golden Bay Cement is moving its operations to a new purpose-built facility at the corner of Tooley and Plumer Streets.

Construction is progressing well with the ship-to-shore pipeline completed and concrete recently being poured for the walls of the new storage facility.
